Industrial Policy Resolution 2001

Industrial Policy Resolution - 2001

- The Industrial Policy Resolution 2001 of the Government of Orissa was focused on building an enabling environment to foreign as well as domestic investors, rather than rely on fiscal subsidies and incentives.
- The Government has proposed deregulation of pre entry and post entry procedures for business, rationalization of labour laws and departmental inspections. Further, to streamline and expedite the process of investment in the state of Orissa, the state government had committed to set up a single window clearance system.

Industrial Policy Resolution - 2001

- According to this Policy, a “Single Window” concept was envisaged to provide:
Faster & one – point clearance

- Single Point dissemination of information related to project and associated clearances to help the prospective investors/entrepreneurs take expeditious investment decisions

Industrial Policy Resolution - 2001

- A team of senior Govt. officers visited and studied the Facilitation Mechanism adopted in states like Tamilnadu, Karnataka Andhra Pradesh.
- Based on their inputs, the Orissa Industries Facilitation Act (OIFA) was enacted by state govt.in 2004.The Rules under the OIFA were notified in March 2005.

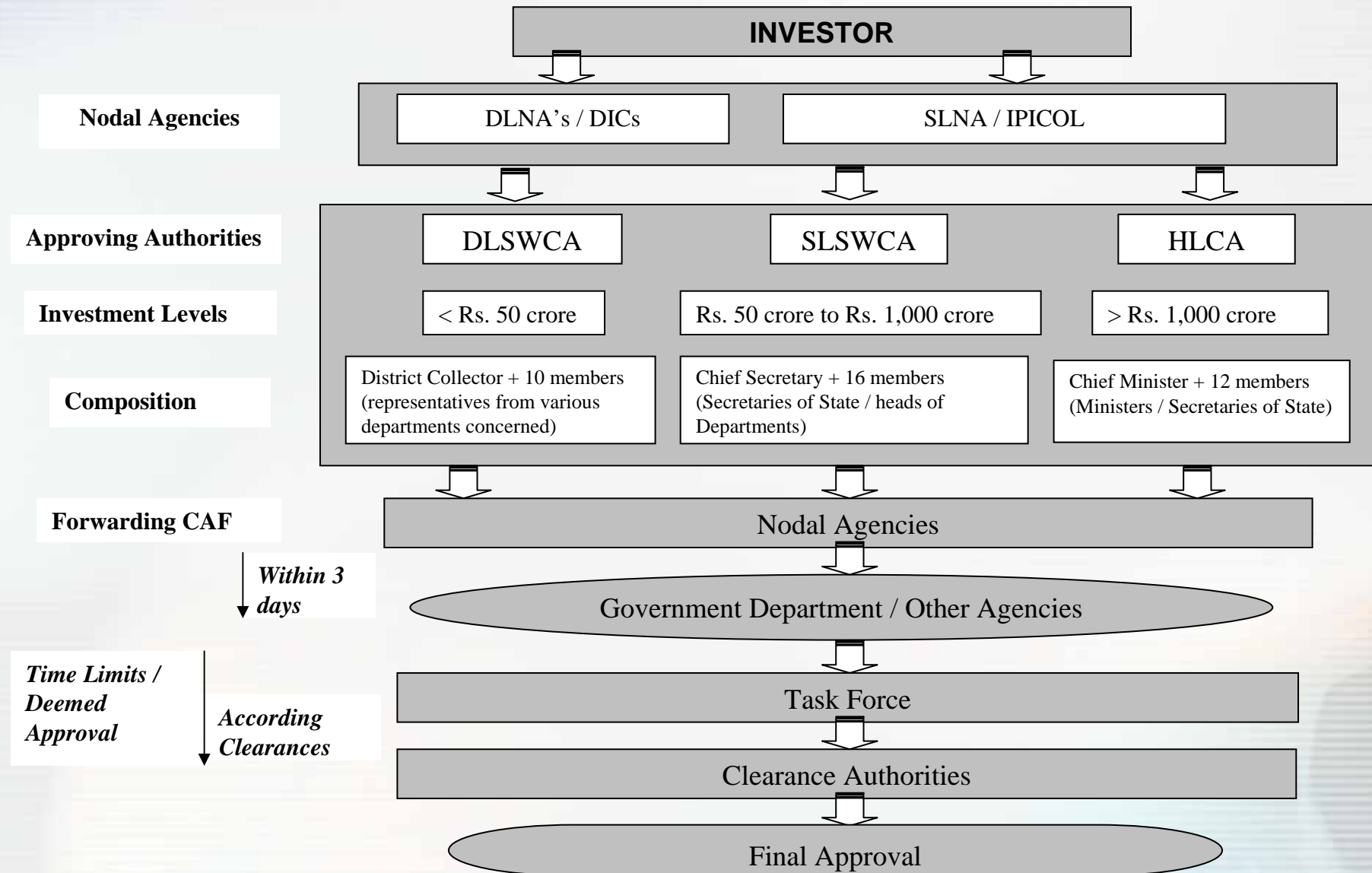
Authorities & Agencies

OIFA envisages a three-tier approval mechanism for according expeditious clearance to industrial projects based on the level of investment.

- **District Level Single Window Clearance Authority** (investments up to Rs. 50 crore)
- **State Level Single Window Clearance Authority** (investments more than Rs.50 crore but less than Rs. 1,000 crore)
- **High Level Clearance Authority** (investments more than Rs. 1,000 crore)
- The Nodal Agencies will also provide escort services and undertake industrial promotion activities to facilitate investors. Besides, the SLNA is also expected to provide support to the government for policy-making.

Single Window System

Best practices

1. The Task Force

The Task Force would periodically monitor the status of implementation of the projects. The Chairman and Managing Director of Orissa Industrial Infrastructural Development Corporation (IDCO) would chair the Task Force. The members of the Task Force would include the officers from the following key departments:

- Forest Officer (not below the rank of DFO)
- GRIDCO (not below the rank of Executive Engineer)
- Water Resources (Not below the rank of Executive engineer)
- State Pollution Control Board (not below the rank of scientist)
- Director of Factories & Boilers (not below the rank of Assistant Director)

Best practices

2. Combined Application Form (SAF)

The Government has prescribed a Combined Application Form for the use of entrepreneurs whose projects are to be approved by any of the Clearance Authorities as an alternative to the existing forms prescribed under any applicable Acts / Rules / Orders / Instructions for obtaining the required clearances and all Departments and authorities concerned shall accept the combined application form for processing and issue of required clearances.

3. Common Register

For creating an investor friendly environment, the maintenance of multiple registers (29 registers under the various acts) has been dispensed with by introducing 3 combined registers.

4. Common Returns

Submission of multiple returns to different departments has been dispensed with and **one single simplified annual return** has been introduced. Similarly one simplified Monthly / Quarterly return has also been introduced. The above mentioned returns **replaces 12 of the existing 95 returns.**

5. Self Certification

The self certification furnished by the entrepreneur involves a declaration from the entrepreneur that the information furnished by him is true and correct. Declaration of incorrect details would be liable for legal consequences.

6. Time bound clearance

Concerned authority shall process the application and communicate its decision to the nodal agency within the time limit specified (not to exceed 30 days from set time limit)

7. Random Inspections

To avoid repeated inspections by the Department of Labour, Inspectorate of Factories and Boilers and the state Pollution Control Board at different levels and also to avoid discretionary choice of establishments for inspection, ***a mechanism for randomized selection of the units for synchronized inspection has been evolved.*** Further, the inspection will be conducted jointly by the above agencies and generally will be once in a year, with prior notice. Surprise inspections will also be conducted based on written complaints, with the approval of higher authorities.

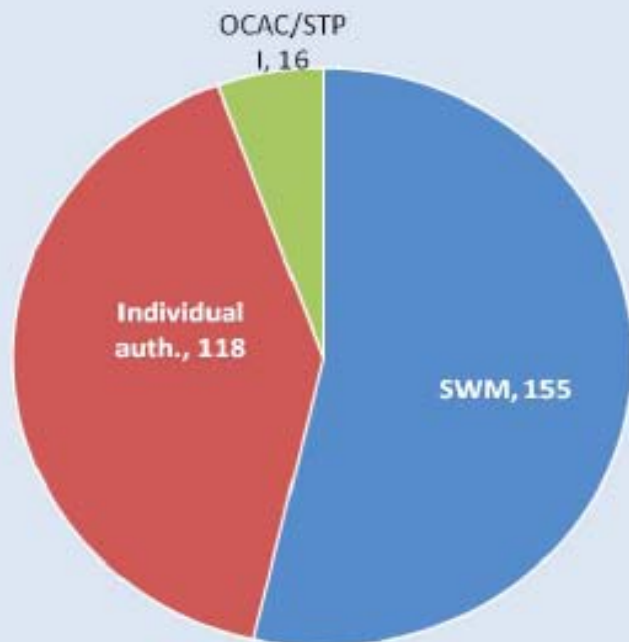

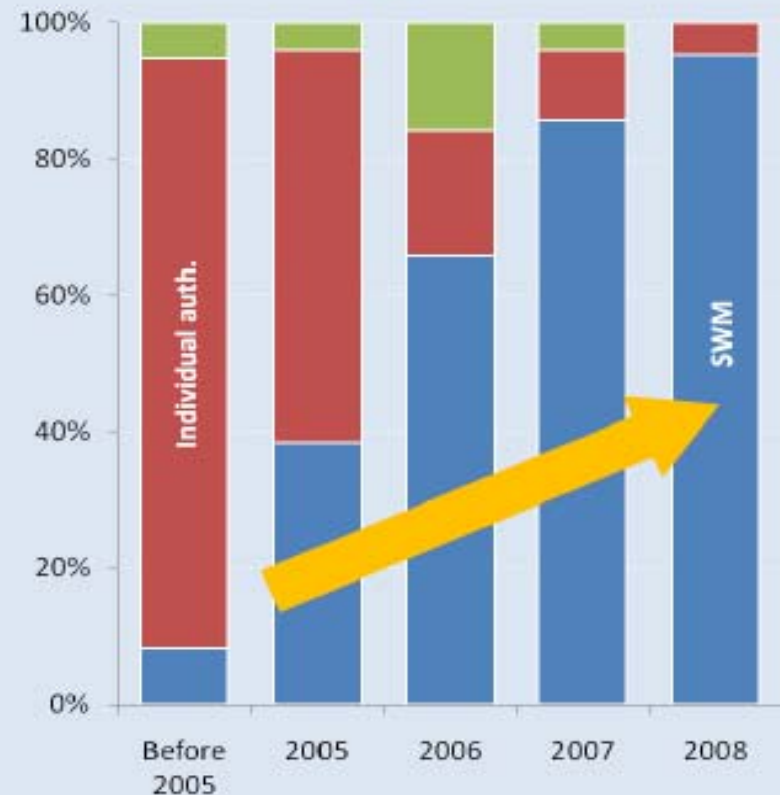

FREQUENCY



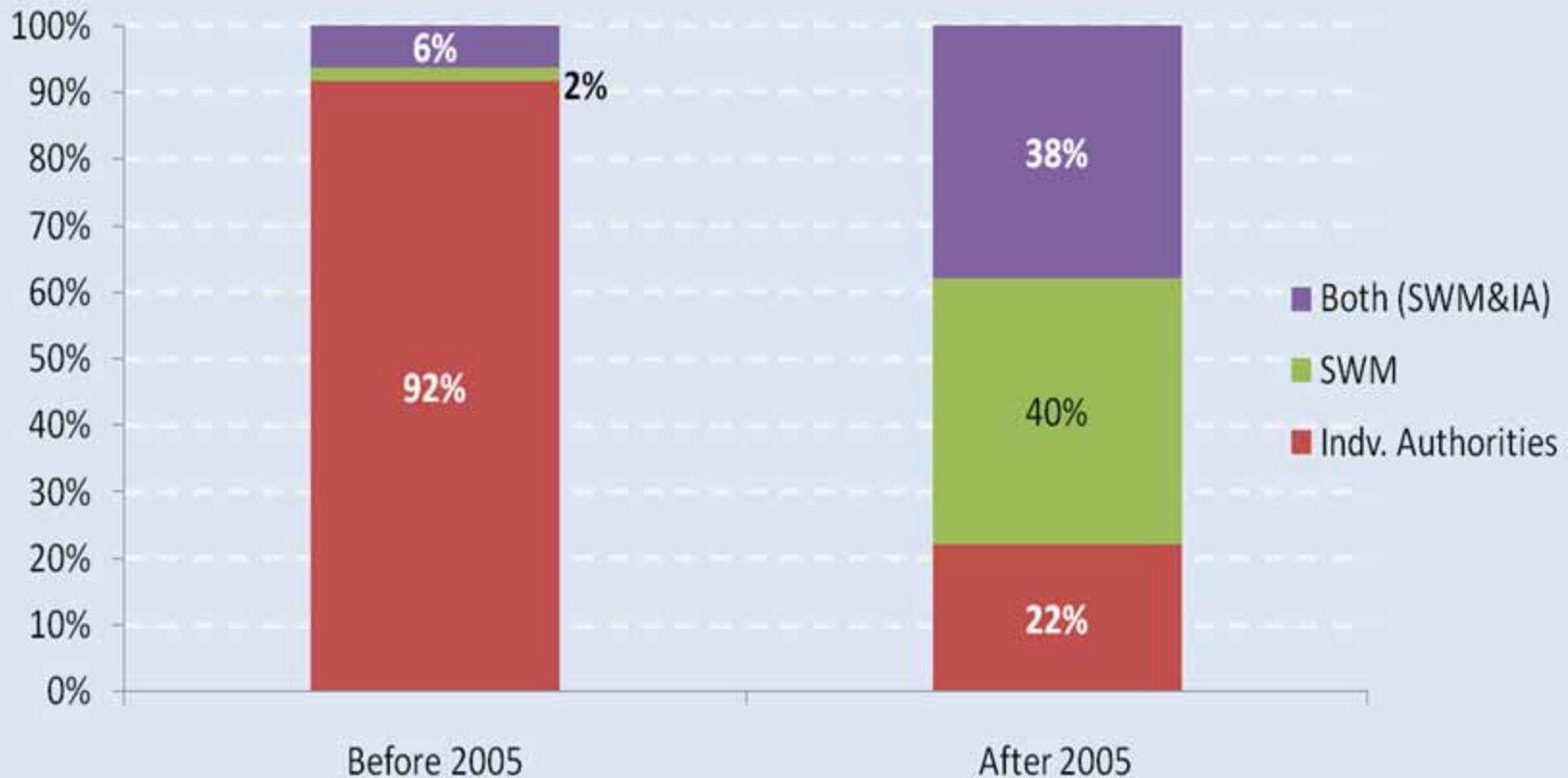
Year of application

9. Investor Grievance Redressal

Investor grievance may arise due to any of the following reasons –

- Approval / clearances not received from the various department / Agencies
- Delay in receipt of approvals / clearances
- Non availability of Common Application Form or other individual forms
- Lack of information / clarification about the various clearances required / accorded – ineffective investor guidance
- Any other matter that has left the investor aggrieved

Best practices

10. Procedure for Grievance Redressal

- Communication by the aggrieved investor
- Recording the Complaint
- Grievance Redressal
- Status Monitoring

(The status reports shall be placed before the Clearance Authorities for the review during their periodic meetings)

(All complaints must be addressed within 14 days from the date of receipt of complaint and resolved within 30 days from the date of receipt of complaint)

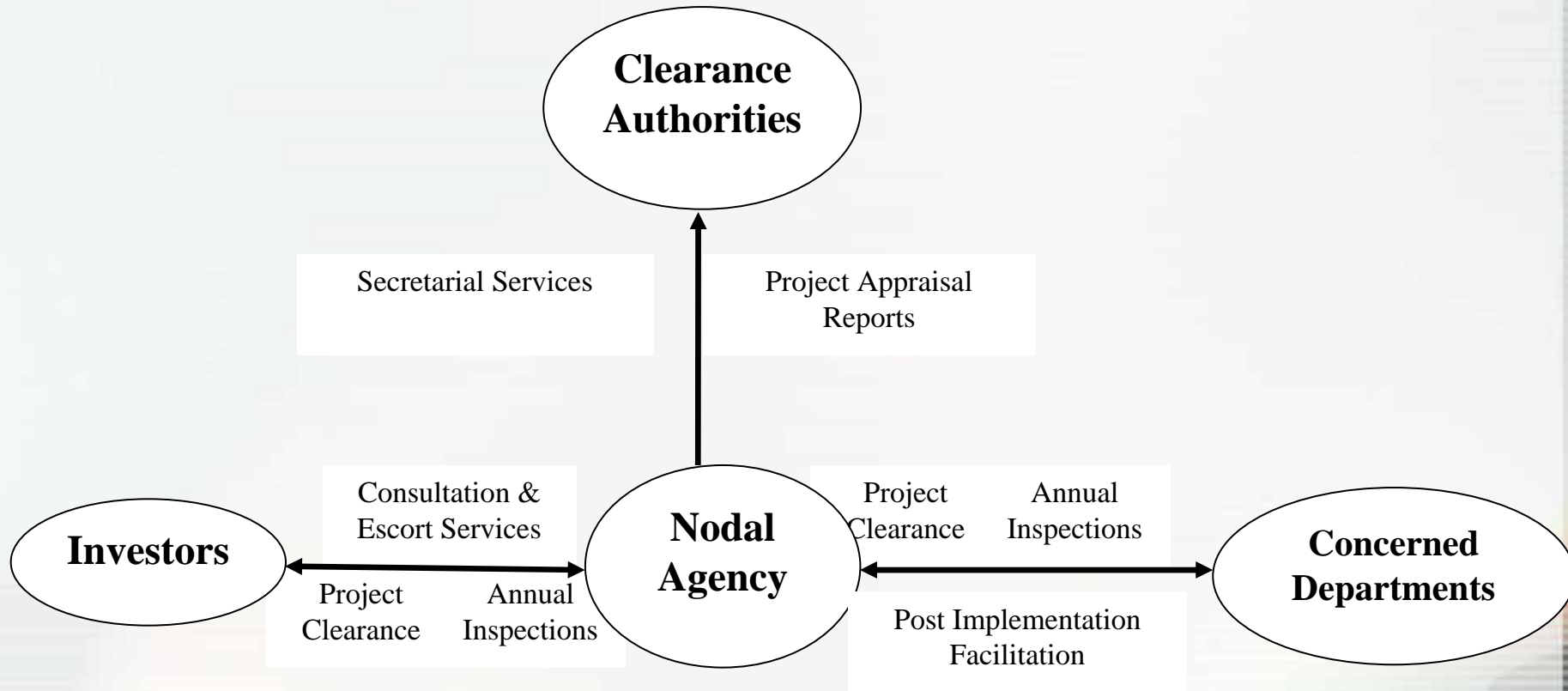
